I wonder if anyone has studied, or will study (so-called) ET "imprinting" among human beings.

Here's a short explanation of the process.

<**Imprinting** is another example of a process that must occur within a distinct, usually short, time period. It is also irreversible and involves an attachment to an object that will evoke subsequent adult behaviors and can be generalized to all examples of the object.>
